Specialist coaches to work alongside teachers when teaching PE - KS2	Observing and then working alongside P.E specialists for staff new to the school during 2016-17, improved their confidence and subject knowledge in their own teaching of sport and PE. Drop-in observations of teaching demonstrated how pupils were kept active at all times throughout PE lessons by the development of different strategies used. Staff audit of skills showed that they were more confident in the sporting areas that had been worked on.	£3,800.00

Playground equipment – KS1&2	A wide range of high quality resources were purchased and available for children at lunch time and play times. Playground leaders have also worked on the infant playground with Foundation Stage and KS1 throughout the whole year. ***Local Competitions:**

Hockey: Year 6 came third (for the third year in a row) in a hockey tournament against 10 teams. Having the specialist hockey coaches for four consecutive years meant that the children had specialist training before taking part in the competition. The coaches mainly worked on skills and rules. One child was referred to a local Hockey club due to his skills he showed during the tournament.

Athletics: Year 5 and Year 6 took part in an Athletics competition at the Athletics club. We took an increased number of children yet again this year. Prior to the events the children had worked with the local secondary school, specialist P.E coaches and their teachers to refine their skills in these areas. We had the most children we have ever had winning medals (19 medals in total). We had more gold medals than silver and bronze.

Football: All Year 2 children attended a Football tournament at the local football stadium. This was the first time ever we had entered KS1 into a competition. The children all worked with a football coach for 3 weeks prior to attending the competition. The Year 2 boy's football team made it to the semi finals. The Year 2 Girl's football team made it to the final and were crowned champions. This was celebrated in school by presenting the children were individual trophies. It was also celebrated in the local newspaper.

The Year 4 girls took part in a football tournament for the first time ever.

Year 5/6 boys took part in a football tournament and came fourth.

Intra competitions: Y1/2 and Y3/4 held intra competitions at the end of their unit of learning. Y1/2 were involved in a mini Olympics competition where all children in Y1/2 were involved. Y3/4 competed in an intra rounders competition. All children in Y3/4 were involved.
